Applying to medical school is an exciting (*and stressful*) time! The medical school application process is complex, time-sensitive, and highly competitive. Errors or delays in your application can have a very negative impact on your chances of acceptance. Therefore, it is essential to be prepared and organized throughout the application process.

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APPLICATION TIMELINE

The medical school application timeline can vary depending on the specific school and program, but generally, the process begins in the summer before the year in which you plan to matriculate. Here is an overview of a typical timeline:

- June to September: Research medical schools, take the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) and begin preparing application materials such as transcripts, test scores, and personal statement.
- September to October: Submit primary application.
- October to December: Receive secondary application from schools and submit additional materials such as letters of recommendation, essays and transcripts.
- December to February: Interviews are held at various medical schools.
- March to April: Receive acceptance, waitlist, or rejection letters from medical schools.
- May: Submit a deposit to the medical school of your choice to secure your spot, and withdraw applications from other schools.

It's worth noting that the above timeline is not universally applicable. Some Medical schools have different application timelines and requirements. It is, therefore, essential to check the specific details of the school you are interested in.

The chart on the following page gives you an idea of the timeline for the major events in the application cycle:



Helpful Hint: *Apply Early*

Most medical schools have rolling admissions. This means that your odds of being accepted are highest at the beginning of the application cycle.

PREREQUISITES

Prerequisites for medical school vary by institution, but generally, most medical schools in the United States require applicants to complete certain undergraduate coursework before applying. The following are common prerequisites for medical school:

- **Biology:** Medical schools typically require at least one year of general biology and one year of advanced biology, such as genetics or microbiology.
- **Chemistry:** Most medical schools require at least one year of general chemistry and one year of organic chemistry.
- **Physics:** Medical schools usually require one year of physics, although some may accept two semesters of physics along with a semester of a related field such as engineering.
- **English:** Medical schools require at least one year of English or other writing-intensive coursework.
- **Mathematics:** Some medical schools may require a semester of college-level math or statistics.

It's important to note that some medical schools may have other prerequisite requirements. For example, some schools want applicants who have research experience. In addition, some medical schools may accept AP or IB credit to fulfill prerequisites. Therefore, it is essential to check the specific requirements of the medical schools you are interested in.

BE PREPARED

Know The Requirements

In order for medical schools to seriously consider you as an applicant, you need to complete certain coursework, amass volunteer and clinical experience, and sit for the MCAT. Some schools may differ slightly on specific prerequisite courses, therefore it is always a good idea to double-check the requirements at any school you apply to.

SCHOOL PLANNING

When choosing medical schools to apply to, there are several factors to consider:

First, research the schools' curriculum and see if it aligns with your interests and career goals.

Second, consider the location of the school. Will it be a good fit for you in terms of cost of living, weather, and proximity to family and friends?

Third, research the school's reputation and selectivity. Some medical schools have a higher acceptance rate than others, and some may have a stronger reputation in certain specialties.

Fourth, consider the school's resources and facilities, including research opportunities, clinical training, and patient population.

Ultimately, the most important thing is to apply to several schools that align with your interests and goals, and that fit well with your personal, academic, and financial situation.

SCHOOL SELECTION

Choose Wisely!

A key determinant of your success in the application cycle is how well you select which schools to apply to. You should plan to select 8-10 schools where your GPA and MCAT score are close to the mean of their current

students (see table below). In addition, you may wish to add 2-3 “safety schools” where your stats exceed the mean of their student body. Similarly, it is acceptable to add a few “reach schools”- places that you would absolutely love to attend, but your scores are below their mean.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Letters of recommendation are an important component of the medical school application process because they provide a third-party perspective on your qualifications, skills, and motivations for pursuing a career in medicine. The admissions committee uses letters of recommendation to gain a deeper understanding of who you are and what you can bring to their program.

First Steps

Selecting Letter Writers

When selecting individuals to write a letter of recommendation for medical school, it's important to consider several factors:

- **Relevance:** It's best to choose recommenders who have direct experience with your academic or clinical skills and can speak to your qualifications for medical school. For example, a former professor who taught a course related to medicine or a physician you have shadowed would be a good choice.
- **Relationship:** The admissions committee is interested in getting to know you through the eyes of others, so choose individuals who know you well and can provide specific examples and anecdotes that showcase your strengths and abilities.
- **Reputation:** Consider selecting recommenders who have a good reputation in their field and are respected by the admissions committee. For example, a well-known physician or researcher in your field of interest would carry significant weight.

- **Availability:** Choose recommenders who have the time and willingness to write a thoughtful, detailed letter on your behalf. Be considerate of your letter writer's time when requesting a letter. It is best to give them at least 4-6 weeks' notice.

Overall, it's important to choose individuals who can speak to your strengths, qualifications, and motivations for pursuing a career in medicine. This will help to make a positive impression on the admissions committee and increase your chances of being accepted into medical school.

WORK AND ACTIVITIES

The 'Work and Activities' section of the AMCAS primary application is an opportunity to give schools an idea of what makes you special. It allows you to show schools the day-to-day activities that have prepared you for medical school. AMCAS gives you the opportunity to select up to 15 experiences to discuss in this section. Of those experiences, you will be able to designate three 'most meaningful experiences'.

APPLICATION TIPS

Selecting Your Experiences

Here are some tips and best practices for completing the 'Work and Activities Section' of your medical school application:

- Highlight leadership and teamwork skills: Emphasize experiences where you have demonstrated leadership and teamwork, especially in healthcare-related activities.
- Focus on quality, not quantity: Rather than listing a large number of activities, choose a few that are meaningful and highlight your achievements and impact.
- Use specific and concrete examples: Rather than making general statements about your experiences, use specific details to illustrate your skills and achievements.
- Show growth and self-reflection: Demonstrate how you have grown and learned from your experiences. In addition, you should show that you have reflected on your strengths and weaknesses as a future healthcare provider.
- Be concise and avoid repetition: Avoid rehashing information from other parts of the application and keep your answers short and to the point.
- Proofread for grammar and spelling errors: A well-written, error-free section shows attention to detail and professionalism.

Keep a log of the dates/times/locations of your clinical experiences. It is especially helpful to keep brief notes about each patient you work with also. (This will allow you to more easily reference patient encounters in your personal statement and during interviews.) PERSONAL STATEMENT

Your personal statement is a vital part of your medical school application. If done correctly, it can greatly enhance your odds of being accepted. Conversely, a poorly executed personal statement can significantly weaken your chances in the application cycle.

BRAINSTORMING

Planning Your Essay

The typical personal statement contains three major sections:

- Opening
- Body
- Conclusion

Keep in mind that using concrete examples and anecdotes will make your essay more compelling.

STAYING ORGANIZED

The application cycle is a fast-paced and busy time. Therefore, it is important to stay organized. Being organized allows you to keep track of important deadlines, submit all required materials in a timely manner, and ensure that you have completed all necessary steps in the application process.
